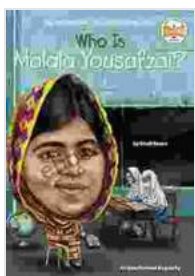


Malala Yousafzai: A Voice for the Voiceless

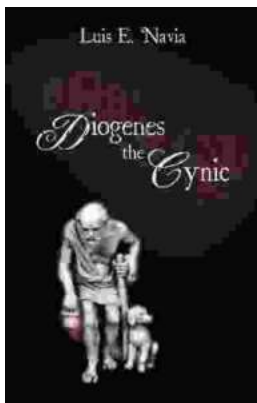

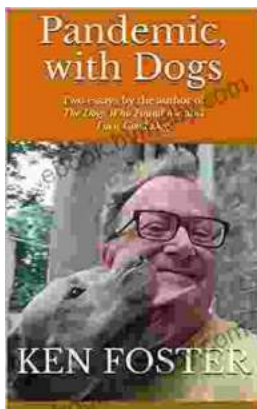
